Dear families and friends,

Last week one of our teachers, Ashlee Doyle attended a digital technologies professional learning day facilitated by Google with many other educators in the region, and one of the key messages was "The New Work Order". What does this mean for us back here at St Anthony's? It prompts us to ponder the question that we ask our young children without thinking; "So what do you want to be when you grow up?" When we ask this question are we really thinking about the kind of workforce of the future that we are preparing them for? Is this really the right question that we should be asking our young people or is it limiting? Some of the key themes of the day were centred around the forces of change:

Automation Globalisation Flexibility

The prediction is that By 2030, every single job will be transformed by technology. We are already seeing the digital disruptions in our everyday lives and the changing nature of services such as the Uber empire. The following skills are becoming more and more important in the 21st century workforce and there has been considerable growth in just 3 years.

Critical thinking 158% Creativity 65% Bilingual skills 181% Digital literacy 212%





By 2030 what we do in every job will change: 30% more time learning on the job Almost 100% more time solving problems

26% more time engaging in self directed work Our schools need to prepare students for jobs of the future that will stem from ideas and knowledge. This is why creativity, resilience, entrepreneurial skills and global awareness are more important than ever. Young people entering technology-rich, global, competitive job markets need different skill sets to what our education system has traditionally valued. The collaborative nature of our learning environments at St Anthony's are enabling us to explore the capabilities required of our future adults. We continue to strive to strengthen this as a key part of the learning and teaching of our school. Active, buzzing and communicative students creating the questions rather than answering them. After all, "People live in the worlds our questions create". Exciting challenges await us in building the portfolio of skills in ourselves for the benefit of our students.



The last time the Catholic Church in Australia held a Plenary Council was in 1937. It has been more than 80 years since we gathered all of the Church together and much has changed. In 2020, we will have a Plenary Council about the future of the Catholic Church in Australia. What are we called to do? Who are we called to be? How do we need to change?

Pope Francis has spoken of the need to engage in the world and respond in faith. He said:

"The defining aspect of this change of epoch is that things are no longer in their place. Our previous ways of explaining the world and relationships, good and bad, no longer appears to work. The way in which we locate ourselves in history has changed. Things we thought would never happen, or that we never thought we would see, we are experiencing now, and we dare not even imagine the future. That which appeared normal to us – family, the Church, society and the world – will probably no longer seem that way. We cannot simply wait for what we are experiencing to pass, under the illusion that things will return to being how they were before."

The journey toward the Plenary Council will help us to prepare to listen to God by listening to one another. We invite all people to engage, to be a part of the listening and dialogue encounter in the next two years.

Together, we are on a journey of listening to God by listening to one another. We invite all Australians to engage in an open and inclusive process of listening, dialogue and discernment about the future of the Catholic Church in Australia.

Your voice is needed – join in! Speak boldly and with passion, listen with an open and humble heart. With faith and guided by God's Holy Spirit, we journey together, toward the future. Our school and Parish will engage in this conversation. More information to come.





Twenty Fifth Sunday In Ordinary Time Gospel

Mark 8:27-35.

And Jesus went on with His disciples, to the villages of Caesare'a Philip'pi; and on the way He asked His disciples. "Who do men say that I am?" And they told Him, "John the Baptist; and others say, Eli'jah; and others one of the prophets." And He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Christ."



We need not be surprised at the slowness of the Apostles in grasping the messiahship of Jesus. He did not want the crowds who flocked to Him to know this until later — after His Resurrection — because they had the idea that the Messiah would be a political leader who would set them free from their subjection to pagan Rome. It was not until this occasion, near Caesarea Philippi, somewhat over a year after He had called them, that He admitted to His Apostles that He was the Messiah. He charged them not to make this fact known outside of their own limited circle. To forestall and erase any wrong ideas of a political leader which some of the Apostles might have, He immediately foretold the sufferings and death He would have to endure at the hands of the leaders of the Jews. He would be conquered and humiliated by His enemies but their victory would be short-lived -- death would not hold Him -- He would rise triumphant on the third day.

To the Apostles this seemed incredible and Peter, their spokesman, told Him so. This outlook of the Apostles is also very understandable. They had seen Him work many miracles, God was evidently very near to Him: how could God let His enemies humiliate and kill Him? They did not know God's plan, they were fishermen and knew little if anything of the Old Testament messianic prophecies. Had they read of the Suffering Servant in second-Isaiah they would not have disbelieved the prophecy of His forthcoming sufferings, death and resurrection. And His mention of His Resurrection after three days, which would prove that it was He and not His enemies who conquered, fell on deaf ears, because the idea of a resurrection of that kind was incomprehensible to them. We know how slow they were to accept His Resurrection even after it had happened.

Although the message was only vaguely and dubiously grasped, Christ had forewarned His Apostles, so as to prepare them for the scandal of the cross. While it did not really prepare them because they were still too worldlyminded, it did help to strengthen their faith once the facts convinced them of the Resurrection. They then realized that their beloved Master was more than Messiah, that He was in fact the Son of God, who with knowledge aforethought freely accepted His humiliations and shameful death for their sakes and ours. They gladly gave their lives to bringing this news of God's great love for men to all nations. From being a scandal the cross became the emblem and the proud standard of God's love for mankind.

PRAYER.
"But who do you say that I am?"

Let us take a moment to reflect on the question. If Jesus spoke to us today, who would we say He is? To answer this question we are not only calling upon our faith but also on our trust in the Lord. So we pray...

Jesus, You ask us over and over, in our joy and pain, "Who do you say that I am?" Let us know who You are. Help us to know the truth and, what we lose for Your sake, let us please find when we give our life away for You.

Early Learning Centre Update 10/9/18

Spring has sprung at the ELC and we have really enjoyed spending longer periods outside in the sunshine. We have been talking with the children about the importance of wearing hats and sunscreen as the UV levels start to get higher during the day. We have been venturing outside of the school grounds more often and exploring local parks. This is an important way that we can teach the children about road safety.

We have been lucky enough to have a visit from Professor Eric and his friend "Thingle Toodle" to teach us about road safety. This session reinforced the importance of "Stop, Look, Listen, Think" and we have been practising this regularly.



We have embarked on an investigative project with the children to think about what we can do to give our outside area a bit of a facelift. The children were keen to build a small gardening area to extend on the work we do at the School's garden so this week we started with some hanging gardens and tomato plants. We are also planting a flower bed that we plan to turn into a fairy garden.





Over the next two weeks we will also be watching over our baby chickens that arrived this morning. They arrived to us in egg form and we are all anxiously awaiting the hatching of the eggs. The children have been learning about the lifecycle of chickens and enjoying role play with small felt chickens and chicks in our sensory tray.
